A Message from Tony

I cannot thank each of you enough for your support during this time as we raise the support needed to get to New York City. I wanted to take a quick moment to remind you why you are giving your prayer and financial support.

New York City is home to over 8.6 million people. That is 2.6% of the entire US population! NYC is growing at a rate of 50,000-60,000 people per year. 35% of the population are foreign-born immigrants. There is representation of 52 unreached people groups in the five boroughs. Only 4% of the NYC population knows Jesus as their Lord and Savior. That means 8.3 million people are currently on a path to be eternally separated from God. Making disciples in New York City is an opportunity to transform the entire world with the gospel through discipleship, planting churches and sending out new missionaries and church planters into the world.
